Our mission is to ensure more labour market transparency for workers, employers and policy makers worldwide, advocating that all workers earn a fair wage under good conditions.

#### **Our Work**

To assist workers, their representatives, employers, and policymakers worldwide, WageIndicator provides coherent, independent and accessible labour market information for 206 countries (including territories and overseas areas) worldwide through 200+ websites in 50+ national languages. Over 40 million people visited these websites in 2021.

To achieve our goals, we designed high-quality global databases on Living Wages, Minimum Wages, Actual Wages, Labour Laws, Collective Agreements and more, that are continously updated. We also developed several tools to gauge cost of living, labour law compliance, worker priorities, and salary levels.

With our quarterly-updated Living Wage database, WageIndicator helps (multinational) companies work towards implementing Living Wages in their supply chains. We help them calculate wage gaps among their workers, create roadmaps to remedy these, and provide technical support as they do so. In this way, we help them create sustainable supply chains and ensure their workers are fairly compensated. Our Living Wages are also used by NGOs in their advocacy campaigns, and by auditing firms to support their clients.

In partnership with leading universities and academic institutes across the world, WageIndicator undertakes cutting-edge research on wages, working conditions, labour law compliance, the gig economy, Collective Agreements, and more.



#### Corporate Social Responsibility and Decent Work in the era of SDGs

An international conference jointly hosted by FLAME University and the WageIndicator Foundation.

#### Introduction

In recent decades, decent work has increasingly been on economic and social agendas, with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) explicitly linking it to economic growth in SDG 8. The International Labour Organisation built on this by framing the Decent Work Agenda around the tenets of SDG 8. Governments actively promote this too; the G20 New Delhi Leader's Declaration in September 2023 committed to the cause of decent work for all workers.

Though global fora like the UN, the ILO, and the G20 may place decent work at the centre of global agendas, the responsibility of implementing decent work across value chains ultimately lies with corporations. This may take the form of paying Living Wages, providing better working conditions, ensuring gender equality, or supporting collective bargaining.

The business case for this is increasingly evident. Growing inequality has a demonstrably negative impact on economic growth, while closing the Living Wage gap could boost the global GDP by 5.4%, adding US\$4.56 trillion annually, through increased productivity and spending at a cost of just \$1.89 trillion. Similarly, the ILO has estimated that poor safety at work costs businesses US\$2.8

trillion annually – 4% of global GDP – through lost working time, interruptions in production, treatment of occupational injuries and diseases, rehabilitation, and compensation.

There is no longer a trade-off between an economy that grows and an economy that helps people thrive. So how can we achieve this?

As we stand at the halfway point between 2016 (SDG adoption) and 2030 (SDG implementation targets), it is necessary to assess how corporations can catalyse the achievement of SDG 8, and how these efforts will fit within the larger realm of corporate social responsibility (CSR). This is all the more apt in a country like India, where notions of CSR have hitherto been narrowly restricted to mandatory philanthropic efforts.

To this end, the WageIndicator Foundation and FLAME University are organising a conference that will be a unique interface between academia and industry, aiming to advance both discourse and action on corporate responsibility.

The conference will be held at FLAME University, Pune, between **21st to 23rd March 2024**.

## Conference themes and call for papers

The conference invites proposals from researchers, academics, and professionals from relevant domains for papers and poster presentations on the following themes:

- The scope of corporate social responsibility
- · The centrality of Living Wages in enabling decent work and economic growth
- The role of governments, labour law, and regulation in decent work
- The power of collective bargaining in ensuring decent work
- The unique challenges of enabling decent work in the gig economy

Proposals beyond the above topics, but aligning broadly with the conference theme, are also welcome.

#### **Submission Guidelines**

#### **Paper submissions**

Applicants interested in presenting a paper at the conference should submit an abstract for the same. Abstracts must be in English and no longer than 500 words. They should contain the following elements:

- Introduction
- Research guestion(s)
- Methodology
- · Contribution to literature
- Findings
- Keywords

Your application will be either accepted for paper presentation, poster presentation, or rejected.

#### Special session submissions

Applicants are also encouraged to submit proposals for special sessions at the conference. These sessions should be for between 60-90 minutes and should take the form of a panel discussion or workshop. Proposals must be in English and should be no more than 500 words. They should include

- The name of the lead organisation
- A description of the session topic and its link with corporate social responsibility, decent work, and the SDGs
- Brief descriptions of individual papers being presented (in case papers are to be presented)
- Ideas for potential speakers

All submissions must be completed by 11:59 PM IST, 15th January and made on this <u>Google Form.</u>

For all proposals that are accepted by the organising committee, applicants must then submit extended abstracts of up to 1,500 words with a detailed description of their hypotheses, methodology, conclusions, and contribution to discourse through this submission link.

#### **Prom Mumbai**

- Cross the expressway
- Change over to the Pune-Bangalore highway
- Reach Wakad Bridge (Rajeev Gandhi InfoTech Park)
- · Continue straight on the Pune-Bangalore highway
- From Wakad Bridge, our site is at a distance of 9 kms
- · Just before the site, you will see a Crystal Honda showroom on the right
- · You will also see a Pink Water Tank on the right
- Take a U-Turn on the Pune-Bangalore highway, 50 mtrs ahead of the Pink Water Tank
- · After the U-Turn, take another U-Turn to go up to the Pink Water Tank road
- FLAME is at a distance of 6.6 kms from the Pune-Bangalore highway turning

# **Prom University Circle, Pune**

- Turn left towards Pashan
  - · At Pashan Village, turn left towards NDA
  - After 3 kms and after the BEL factory, turn right towards the Pune-Bangalore highway
