ASSAM APPEALS FOR FINANCING FROM WORLD BANK FOR RURAL BRIDGE PROGRAMME

The Assam Government has applied for monetary assistance from the World Bank for the Assam Resilient Rural Bridges Programme in an effort to improve rural connectivity in the state. This program's goal is to improve the Assam Public Works and Road Department's capacity to manage roads and bridges while establishing strong, inclusive, and durable connectivity in rural Assam. Due to the significant building expenses involved, the state government has requested financial aid. A previous open bidding process for the construction of 21 rural bridges under 48 crores had been initiated by the Assam PWD.

MLA DAHIYA DIRECTS COOP. DEPTT FOR UNINTERRUPTED SUPPLY OF FERTILIZER TO FARMERS, TOOLS FOR STUBBLE MANAGEMENT

MLA Rural Rjnessh Dahiya headed over a significant gathering with the elected officials of the Cooperative Department for the continuous supply of fertiliser for planting wheat to the farmers and agricultural equipment for managing stubble. He said that Punjab will only be successful if our farmers are content. As a result, farmers should avoid any sort of issues and should receive a continuous supply of fertiliser during wheat season. According to him, throughout the paddy season, farmers should get education on how to properly dispose of grass and receive equipment through authority. In the meantime, he warned that anybody noticed selling fertiliser illegally would face harsh punishment. Additionally, he urged the farmers in the area not to burn the paddy waste.

In October, the paddy crop is harvested all over the nation. In North India, occurrences of stubble burning are also rising at this time. Every year, a significant number of these instances also take place in Haryana. To prevent farmers from burning stubble, the government is implementing a program to raise awareness. Farmers who burn stubble are being subjected to harsh punishment. A farmer in Karnal is producing well by using stubble as fertilizer in his fields rather than burning it.

According to farmer Samarth Singh, he tends to 60 acres of land. On part of these acres, they use a cutter to harvest the stubble and blend it into the soil (in-see-to management), while on other acres, they use a baler to create bales (exsee-to management).



JAMMU & KASHMIR

HAILSTORM DAMAGES APPLE CROP IN SOUTH KASHMIR

The unharvested apple crop was severely damaged by a severe hailstorm that struck numerous villages in the Shopian and Kulgam districts of south Kashmir on Sunday evening. The villages of Kanjiullar, Kapran, Feripora, Pratappora, and Vehil in the Shopian district were impacted by the hailstorm. The hailstorm, which predicted disaster for the unharvested crop, lasted for about 8 to 10 minutes, according to Muhammad Asif, a farmer from Kanjiullar, who spoke with Greater Kashmir. He indicated that around 60 percent of the crop in the region was yet to be harvested. The apple farmers have gone through massive losses over recent years due to the perennial shutdown of the Srinagar-Jammu National Highway, market glut, and unseasonal snowstorms.

TRADERS' BODY URGES TO LIFT BAN ON MUSLIM VENDORS IN TEMPLE FAIRS FOR DASARA FESTIVAL

A traders' association in coastal Karnataka is requesting district authorities to permit Muslim vendors to participate in temple fairs during the upcoming Dasara festival season. Last year, some shrines banned Muslim vendors, citing concerns raised by Hindu groups. The association, comprising members from diverse religious backgrounds, seeks permission for Muslim vendors to set up stalls on public roads near temples, not within temple premises. The ban started amid the hijab controversy in Karnataka, with the BJP government justifying it using existing rules. The association is concerned about the economic losses experienced by Muslim vendors.

KERALA

MGNREGA: KERALA WORKERS' ORGANISATIONS TO LAUNCH NATIONWIDE PROTEST IN FRONT OF PARLIAMENT

The NREG Workers' Federation, affiliated to the All India Trade Union Congress (AITUC) is planning to launch a nationwide protest opposing the reduction in working days and budget for MGNREGA. Centre's reduced budget allocation is said to have reduced working days and wages. The centre had sanctioned only 6 crore working days, when the Kerala government had prepared a labor budget for 10 crore days. The General Secretary of the Union General, S Rajendran, alleges that these changes weaken the scheme. fMajor demands of the federation include increasing wage from Rs. 333 to Rs.700, ensuring 200 working days, inclusion of NREGA workers under the ESI limit, formulation of national welfare board, provision of additional wage to matrons for additional work, and inclusion of workers in group insurances among others.

MADHYA PRADESH NARMADAPURAM- SAVED BARREN LAND FROM CHEMICAL FERTILIZERS: NARMADAPURAM FARMER DOES ORGANIC FARMING, ALSO MAKES FERTILIZER; PROFIT 3.5 LAKH

Chemical fertilizers are widely used by farmers to increase yields. Roop Singh Rajput is a farmer from Rohna village who has developed a distinctive reputation by practicing organic farming. He owns roughly 4 acres of land for farming. He spent 13 years farming using chemicals but wasn't making much profit. Even premium grains were hard to get by. He considered switching to organic farming in 2012–2013 and then took training from the Agricultural Department. Chemical fertilizers according to him produce well for a few years but the soil's fertility begins to decline and the area gradually turns arid leading to a decline in production. He produces manure using cow dung and vermicompost. He has received high-quality grains, increased soil fertility, and made a yearly profit of 3.5 lakhs.

STRUGGLE OVER LOCAL MANAGMENT, IN SANEGAON, WOMEN ATTEMPT TO SET THEMSELVES ON FIRE.

A conflict rose at Sanegaon Jetty after a local dumper owner was run over by a car while opposing outside dumper traffic. The incident led to roadblocks on Alibag-Roha road and some women even tried to set themselves on fire. Indo Energy International Jetty, located in Sonegaon, brings coal for the steel company through barges. The jetty management and local dumper owners are in conflict over the increase in transport rates and locals' complaints of extortion. A local dumper owner who was protesting the tension at the jetty was run over by a train and seriously injured.

This order was issued to restore normalcy in the ethnic conflict ridden state after such media went viral on social media platforms. Any person in possession of such images or videos can go to the nearest police station in any jurisdiction, and submit them for taking appropriate action.

Chief Minister Naveen Patnaik launched a new scheme'Ama Odisha, Nabin Odisha' (our Odisha, New Odisha), which will provide Rs. 50 Lakh to every panchayat to protect places of worship, upgrade sites of historical significance, and improve rural infrastructure and digital access. The main controversy surrounding the policy comes from the opposing BJP party, which pointed put that the advertisement of the policy uses the conch symbol, which is the symbol of the BJD party. Additionally, they have an issue with the timing of the policy. A BJP spokesperson said that they will take this issue to the courts and try to repeal the policy or change its implementation to reduce any public bias which may come up during the elections.


₹I2I CRORE SCAM UNEARTHED IN PUNJAB RURAL DEVELOPMENT & PANCHAYATS DEPT

Six villages in Block Ludhiana-2, namely Salempur, Sekhewal, Selkiana, Bounkar Gujran, Kadiana Khurd, and Dhanansu, received a total award of ₹252.94 crore after the acquisition of hundreds of acres of land. However, 120.87 crores of this money was embezzled by Block Development and Panchayat Officers (BDPOs), panchayat secretaries, and Sarpanches. Minister of Punjab rural development and panchayat minister, Laljit Singh Bhullar has ordered a probe into this matter because no one can withdraw money from this Fixed Deposit without administrative and technical approvals.

HOME VOTING FACILITY TO ELIGIBLE VOTERS FOR THE FIRST TIME IN RAJASTHAN

On October 12, 2023, Rajasthan Chief Electoral Officer Praveen Gupta informed that for the first time in Rajasthan, the Commission will provide home voting facility to eligible voters. This is applicable for senior citizens above 80 years and those with over 40% disabilities. To utilize this service, eligible voters must fill out a 12-D form within 5 days of the election notification, submitted to booth-level officers. The list of home voters will be shared with recognized political parties.

Mahalaya Amavasai, spanning from the full moon to the new moon in the month of Puratasi, is the period when ancestors, or Pitrus, are believed to descend from the sky to Earth. Puratasi Amavasya, the main day of this observance, is considered the optimal time for Bidurkarma, including darpanam offerings. Offering darpanam on this day is thought to be as beneficial as offering it for all the months. During Mahalaya Amavasai, many people gathered in Trichy, taking a holy dip in the Cauvery river and performing rituals to honor their ancestors at locations like Trichy Srirangam Amma Mandapam Paditura, Veereswaram Garuda Mandap, and Melur Ayyanar Temple.

Five people in Tripura are in the hospital after a sudden outbreak of malaria. Some of them were left unattended for several days with high fevers and the outbreak has been spreading to villages other than the source. The patients admitted at the hospital range in age from 1 year old to 65 years old. Locals reported that authorities had not used DDT spray in the mosquito prone areas and that many more people are sick but unable to bear the financial burden of travel and hospitalization.

'BLOOD-SOAKED BODY FOUND ON NH IN ALIPURDUAR, INVESTIGATION UNDERWAY'

The previous Saturday night, Gourab, a security guard employed by a nearby hotel, had informed his family that he would be arriving late. However, the next day, his blood-soaked body was found at the Dima Setu sector of National Highway 31. Officials from the Kalchini police station and Nimti Outpost swiftly arrived at the scene to recover the body after receiving a tip. An ongoing, thorough investigation is currently underway to determine the circumstances surrounding this unsettling incident.

THREE DEAD, SEVERAL FEARED TRAPPED IN COAL MINE COLLAPSE IN WEST BENGAL

A coal mine collapse in West Bengal's Paschim Bardhaman district resulted in at least three fatalities, with more individuals feared trapped. The incident occurred during illegal coal extraction from an Eastern Coalfields Limited (ECL) mine in the Narayankudi area. The victims were identified as Dinesh Ruidas (38), Sumir Bauri (17), and Surjit Sen (21). An investigative team led by Sitarampur's Director General of Mines Safety Region 1, Irfan Ahmed Ansari, attributed the incident to illegal extraction in a legal mine. Rescue operations are ongoing to locate and assist those trapped in the mine.
