JAGANANNA AROGYA SURAKSHA SCHEME TO BE LAUNCHED ON SEPTEMBER 30

The Jagananna Arogya Suraksha scheme is launching on September 30, aimed at helping the underprivileged. Health Minister Vidadala Rajini revealed plans for an awareness campaign starting on September 15, followed by a comprehensive health survey beginning on September 16. The survey will identify various health issues, including chronic conditions, nutritional needs for pregnant women and new mothers, and diseases like leprosy and TB.

The Assam government recently conducted an inspiring drone technology demonstration, planned together by Krishi Vigyan Kendra Golaghat, Assam Agricultural University Jorhat, Department of Agriculture Assam, and Brihangam Farmers Production Company Bokakhat. This was done in an effort to integrate modern technology into the state's agricultural practices.


DRUNK SON KILLS FATHER WITH AXE FOR NOT GIVING MONEY TO DRINK ALCOHOL.

A drunk son killed his 65 year old father, Prabhu Narayan Singh, as he refused to give him the money for buying more alcohol. Enraged by this, under the influence of alcohol, he killed his father by slitting him with an axe. This happened in the Narha village under Suppi police jurisdiction. Soon after the incident took place, the station was informed, and the police immediately arrested the son, Rajababu Singh who was seen hiding the cattle house. The weapon was retrieved.

His mother, Rama Devi, said that her son often asked them both for money. Many times, they would give in due to their son's constant insistence. However, she never expected her son to take such a grave step. The incident has been filed under FIR for murder and further actions are being taken.

In last one and a half years, development works including paver blocks, roads, sewer lines have been done in the village at a cost of approximately 2 crores.

It took artisans from Madhya Pradesh two months to carve the Ramayana paintings at a cost of Rs 8.61 lakh.






JAMMU & KASHMIR

On Sunday, Deputy Commissioner Dr. Devansh Yadav displayed cutting-edge indoor saffron cultivation equipment, a key step towards revolutionising saffron agricultural practices in the Kishtwar region. The unveiling of indoor saffron cultivation technology demonstrates the Kishtwar administration's dedication to advancing innovations in agriculture and improving the livelihoods of the saffron farming community through different modes of cultivation.

It is worth noting that the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir has a monopoly on saffron growing in India, producing approximately 7.3 percent of the world's saffron.





KARNATAKA

II PEOPLE DIED IN PAST I5 DAYS AT KARNATAKA DUE TO HUMAN-ANIMAL CONFLICT

In the past week, 15 individuals have died in Karnataka due to human-animal conflicts. With the highest number of elephants in the country and the second highest number of tigers, the need to converse and protect these big mammals is in dire need. With less rainfall and forest land, these animals are forced to seek food in human settlements and farms, which leads to these unfortunate attacks. Highways also result in a large number of roadkills of these mammals.

Karnataka Minister for Forest, Ecology, and Environment Eshwar Khandre, urged the center to release funds of over 500 crores for the setup of railway barricades and conflict prevention methods along the forest borders. Research by the Indian Institute of Science proves the effective long-term solution to the current problem.

IDUKKI - A TRIBAL VILLAGE RECLAIMS TOP SPOT AS KERALA'S LARGEST DISTRICT

On September 5, the government of Kerala issued a notification to expand the land area of Idukki (or Edamalakuddy), a tribal village from 4,48,504.64 hectare to 4,61,223.14 hectare making it the largest district in Kerala. Earlier this spot was held by Palakkad, which changed with implementation of the Forest Rights Act of 2006, according to which 10-acres of land is granted to tribals living within forests for their livelihood.

The farmers from Lalpur, Umaria, and Ghanghri brought up the matter on Monday when they visited the executive engineer's office at the Water Resources Department Headquarters. It was brought to their attention that numerous areas of the Umdar canal are damaged, preventing water from getting to the farmers' fields and causing the water to go elsewhere.

2 DIE, IO FALL ILL DUE TO DIARRHOEA OUTBREAK IN MP'S CHHINDWARA

A dozen villagers of Kosmi Village in the Chhindwara district were admitted to the Amarwada hospital after complaints of vomiting and diarrhoea and two of them passed away as well. Kosmi village is a tribal development block in the Amarwada tehsil.

The villagers fell ill after consuming contaminated water from a hand pump according to the village priest. However, after initial probing by Sub-divisional Magistrate Hemkaran Dhurve, the two diseased passed away due to other ailments.

In Kotoli, a disturbing incident of caste abuse and death threats has occurred, leading to a case being filed at the Panhala police station following a complaint by Sushila Dinkar Kamble. Kamble, a resident of Kotoli, had cultivated vegetables in her farm (Group No. 19) and erected a protective fence around her crops. On Thursday, the 31st, she caught Laxman Natha Chowgule, Aditya Laxman Chowgule, and Sangita Laxman Chowgule, all from Kotoli, removing vegetables and dismantling the fence.



MANIPUR COPS FILE FIR AGAINST FOUR OVER EDITORS GUILD REPORT

The Manipur government initiated a police case against the president and three members of a fact-finding team of the Editors Guild of India (EGI). The CM, N Biren Singh, accused the team which was sent to Manipur of provoking clashes, and said that they didn't understand the crisis, its background and the state's history. The All Manipur Working Journalists' Union and the Editors Guild Manipur also threatened to take legal action against them if the team didn't clarify the alleged misrepresentations in the report.

However, the Press Club of India demanded that the case be withdrawn with immediate effect, and the Indigenous Tribal Leaders' Forum also condemned the FIR, citing that no journalist or representative from the Meitei or tribal community followed them nor influenced their judgment.

LAND GRAB: DESPITE PUNJAB CM'S ORDER, DCS FAIL TO RECOVER MONEY FROM REALTORS

CM Bhagwat Mann ordered the recovery of money from real estate developers who had procured about 80 acres of panchayat land worth INR 500 crores, and has been under their control for over a decade. Even after the meeting with CM Mann and his direction to DCs who head the Land Price Fixation Committee, not even a single district has addressed the issue. Some developers want to give the land back but are unable to because of the inefficiency of the DCs. Many developers have already constructed on panchayat land or have sold it off to other private players.


RAJASTHAN TO OPEN IK KITCHENS IN VILLAGES, PROVIDE MEALS AT ₹8, SAYS GEHLOT





A petition has been submitted to the Madurai High Court by a resident of Veppankulam village in Madurai district, raising concerns about the presence of a Kaliyamman temple near the village hall due to an alleged attempt by a panchayat president to dismantle the existing temple and replace it with a new one. The construction work under the pretext of temple renovation has disrupted access to the residences located in front of the temple. Despite previous assurances from the government that temple construction would cease, work has resumed, prompting questions about the authorization for this activity.

They demanded that the government address their water needs through alternative means and prioritize the preservation of local water sources. The protest highlighted the ongoing challenges of water resource management and the need for sustainable solutions to ensure access to clean drinking water for communities.

PREGNANT WOMAN CARRIED OVER 20KMS TO HOSPITAL IN DOLI

In a distressing incident in a remote village in Telangana's Bhadradri-Kothagudem district, a pregnant tribal woman, Marakkam Kosi, was carried for over 20 kilometers to the nearest medical facility due to the lack of roads in the region. Villagers used a makeshift stretcher ('doli') mounted on their shoulders to transport her through muddy terrain and rainwater-filled areas amid rainfall. This is not an isolated case, as approximately 25 tribal villages in the region lack road connectivity. Kosi, 36 weeks pregnant, experienced critical hypertension during the journey but underwent an emergency C-section and delivered a healthy baby boy, thanks to timely medical intervention.

DM WHO BROUGHT WATER TO UTTAR PRADESH VILLAGE SHUNTED OUT, PUT ON WAITING LIST

District Magistrate Divya Mittal successfully brought piped water to Lahuria Dah, a village in Mirzapur, Uttar Pradesh, on August 30. This marked a significant improvement for the village, which had relied on tankers and a nearby reservoir for its water needs. However, Mittal was transferred to Basti district on September 1, sparking controversy. The local BJP leader complained about her involvement in the inauguration event, arguing that it was not her responsibility. Subsequently, the water pipeline was damaged by "anti-social elements" on September 4, leaving the village once again without a water supply.

WEST BENGAL

MEGA DRINKING WATER PROJECT TO START AFTER PUJA IN SILIGURI

Finally, the much-awaited mega drinking water project for 47 wards in Siliguri is going to start after Durga Puja under the supervision of Siliguri Municipal Corporation. The drinking water scheme will have a capacity of 135 million litres per day (MLD). This will increase the present drinking water supply. Additionally, the scheme will be set up in Gajdola and will cost Rs 511.08 crore.

At present, drinking water is supplied from the water treatment plant at Fulbari and the present demand is 70 MLD for a population of around 10 lakhs, while the supply is only 55 MLD. The project will be completed in 18 months with 3 months trial run.
